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

A Hoarding Rescue

Rescuing a dog from a hoarding situation can be both **challenging and rewarding.** These dogs may have had to compete for food and territory. They can have limited socialization skills resulting in fearfulness of other animals and people. It takes patience and gentleness to acquire their trust.







Our trainer Greg Gibbs and fantastic volunteers are working with some dogs that came from a hoarding situation. Taz, Kiwi and Wilson are cattle dogs that came to us from Lyon County, and we are working to overcome their fears. It is a slow process of just sitting and talking with the dogs in their kennel. Eventually they get used to the human touch, a lead over their heads and walking outside their safe space.

Taz is a sweet wiggle butt who is happy to see you, liking this new adventure of taking a walk. Although he does balk at crossing the road, he is overcoming that fear. Back in the safety of his kennel he is patient and listens to all the stories you can tell him.

Wilson is a handsome young dog, still getting used to the leash. He will walk outside on his terms and lets you know when it's time to come back in. He likes having kennel visits. He could be a Homeland Security dog the way he sniffs you all over before you can sit down with him.

Kiwi was one of their pack. She was much more outgoing and conquered most of her fears faster than the boys and was adopted out to her loving family.

Taz and Wilson will get there in time; some patient person will come for them.





Hard to Adopt Cats

Oh....those kittens!! They are cute, cuddly and sweet. And this year there are a lot of them....why would you look at the older cats? Let me give you some examples of current residents of the cat cottage that are worth a serious look. Each of these cats has a special and unique story....but mostly they are brought to the shelter because of a situation that causes them to lose their families. It is difficult for them to adjust to the change of a home vs shelter life. DAWG volunteers and shelter staff try to make all of the residents feel comfortable and loved. In residence at this writing:

Monkey, a black and white spayed female with medium long hair is 9 years old and is currently on medication for a thyroid condition. Monkey lost her family and has been at the shelter for about 3 months.

Kelly is another beautiful young girl - only 2 years old - looking for her forever home! She is a mostly white gal with calico markings. Kelly is extremely affectionate and loves to lounge in the sun.

Mia and Jamal were recently surrendered together. Mia is a 7 year old spayed female tortishell with longer hair. She came into the shelter with her partner Jamal, a 7 year old neutered male short-haired orange tabby. They would love to find a new home together. They were surrendered because the dogs didn't care for them.

Haley is a 10 year old long-haired calico spayed female. She is a beautiful cat but she is very shy. She is looking for a quiet home and a patient new owner.

All of these cats are up to date on their vaccinations, are spayed or neutered and are microchipped.

These cats are just looking for their special and forever home. Even though all of their needs are met in the cat cottage, there is no substitute for a loving family and a home of their own. If you are looking for that special kitty friend for your home, please come to the cat cottage and meet these wonderful cats. They can't wait to meet you... and hopefully go home with you!

DAWG's **Fix A Family Pet (FAFP)** is a low cost spay and neuter voucher program for Douglas County residents' dogs and cats. To qualify, two proofs are required –

Financial eligibility
 Douglas County residency.

Proof of Financial Eligibility. If the resident receives any of the following benefits such as: Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, SNAP/ Quest food stamps, Nevada Checkup, WIC, free or discounted school lunches, family assistance, disability, unemployment, or have income below \$2,082 a month, they could be eligible for the program.

Proof of Douglas County Residency. If the photocopy of the financial eligibility benefit has your Douglas County address on it, then it can serve as Proof of Residency. If it doesn't, then you must include a copy of your Driver's License, a rent receipt, or a utility, phone or cable bill, etc.

You must provide a photocopy of the program's form. To start the process, please call our FAFP program phone number 775-901-2821 and talk with our Application Coordinator.

In addition to the proofs, there is a co-pay of \$25 for each cat and \$50 for each dog. We accept only MONEY ORDERS or CASHIER'S CHECKS. There is no limit on the number of cats or dogs in a household that may be fixed.

After you have received, completed, signed and dated the FAFP application, please mail it along with the money order or cashier's check and your supporting documentation (proof of financial eligibility & Douglas County residency) to the DAWG post office box address shown on the application. Once the Voucher Coordinator has received and reviewed your application, you should receive your FAFP Voucher(s) in about 7–10 days. When you have the voucher, you should call the participating veterinary office to make your pet's **Fix A Family Pet appointment** for the spay (female) or neuter (male) procedure. You are responsible to bring the pet and the FAFP voucher to the appointment. If you wish to get your pet(s) vaccinated during the same appointment, the vaccinations are your financial responsibility.

If you are a Veteran or Active
Military Service person with proof of
military service this will qualify you
for this program as well. You do have
to provide a copy of the proof of your
Douglas County residency, a money
order or cashier's check and a copy of
the proof of military service such as
the separation from service form or
VA medical card for example.
