Thank you to all staff, volunteers and adopters! ❤️




Kitty Happenings

DAWG's Found Cat (short term foster) and TNR (feral cat spay/neuter/vaccinate/return) are two very important programs that help Douglas County's stray and feral felines. The unfortunate reality is that many of these domestic cats had been abandoned by their owners, so they struggle to survive the ever-present problems associated with homelessness.

The programs' wonderful volunteers are always busy, but especially so during spring and summer months. I'd like to highlight a few who share in this uniquely rewarding work.

Kathryn excels at rehabilitating cats and kittens that are extremely skittish, nervous around people and in need of a lot of patience and TLC. This woman is amazing! She takes in terrified, antisocial, sometimes traumatized kitties and eventually earns their trust, turning their lives around for the better. One of the cats Kathryn recently took in is a beautiful female that had experienced severe neglect and was absolutely terrified! She was deemed unadoptable and at risk of being euthanized because she growled and lashed out at anyone who came near her. Kathryn quite literally saved her life by agreeing to take her in to "work her magic." In just a few short weeks, this cat was able to decompress, relax and gradually started displaying her true, sweet personality. She now craves Kathryn's attention and is such a joy. There's no doubt Kathryn has a special gift and we're so grateful to have her on board!



Eloise and Tracee are the dynamic duo who run DAWG's TNR program. The plight of feral cats is truly heartbreaking, but these two are determined and work tirelessly to control the feral population by humanely trapping and transporting feral cats to and from spay/neuter appointments.

Because the animal shelter will only take in stray/found cats and kittens after a mandatory waiting period, found adoptable kittens may come into the Found Cat program for temporary foster care pending intake/adoption from Douglas County Animal Services. Tracee has created an amazing temporary "makeshift nursery" where some of our found homeless kittens can go short term before being transferred to foster homes.

Be Fire Ready!

Approximately 40,000 pets die each year in house fires. We live in an area where fire danger is high.

Please develop an evacuation plan and make a portable emergency kit with enough supplies to last at least seven days. It should include:

- Pet ID tags
- Medications
- Medical records
- Leashes, harnesses, carriers
- Current photos of your pets in case they are lost
- Bowls
- Emergency contact phone numbers and addresses
- Cat boxes and litter
- Plastic bags and paper towels to clean up waste
- Toys and pet beds
- Can opener
- Food and water

Preparation is the key to fire safety!



GOOD REASONS TO FIX YOUR PIT BULL

1. Because you love your dog.
2. Neutering can help keep your pit bull from roaming after female dogs in heat.
3. Your pit bull will be less aggressive towards other dogs. However, if your dog has behavioral problems, he will still need training and socialization.
4. Spaying will prevent your dog from having unwanted puppies. Pit bulls are by far the most euthanized breed in American shelters.
5. Neutering your pit bull will reduce the behavior of marking territory.
6. Neutering can reduce the risk of testicular cancer, prostate disorders and diabetes.
7. Because you love your dog!!



DAWG's Fix a Pit Bull program can help you get your pit bull or pit bull mix spayed or neutered. The program charges only \$25 for a spay/neuter voucher. Requirements are proof of Douglas County residency and a visual verification of the dog's breed. There are no restrictions based on income.

Shelter Cooperation





Regional Shelter Cooperation is a cooperative endeavor among local shelters in Douglas, Lyon, El Dorado, Solano and Mono counties.

This effort transfers animals from high census and kill shelters to low census and no kill shelters (high census shelters are those where animals are turned away due to lack of shelter space). This gives these pets a better chance of exposure and adoption.

All transferred animals are screened before adoption. They must have no major medical issues, and they must not display signs of aggression or have biting histories.

This cooperative effort was vital in moving pets from homes and shelters endangered by fires last summer. It also saves the lives of many animals and is a positive approach to animal care in our community.
