DAWG launches campaign for new shade structures at animal shelter

Time outside is especially precious if you're a shelter dog. It doesn't matter if it's raining, snowing or blazing hot, outdoors is THE place to be.

To meet the dogs' need for outdoor time, the Douglas County Animal Services shelter has three fenced exercise yards where shelter dogs can chase balls, frolic in kiddie pools, and sniff the ground in search of strange scents to their heart's delight.

Each area has a shade structure meant to protect volunteers, visitors and dogs from the desert sun, rain and snow – and each structure needs replacement.

Their wooden posts are showing signs of deterioration, hastened no doubt by the number of dogs who lift their legs on the posts.

The roofs of two of the structures are tilting to the point that taller volunteers and visitors have hit their heads. The shade structure in the largest yard was placed in such a way that people must stand outside it during certain times of the day to be in the shade.

"For afternoon volunteers, the sun can be brutal," says frequent dog walker Roxanne Hart. "A larger shade structure will allow more protection for the volunteers, visitors, and dogs."

#### "Made in the Shade"

DAWG is launching the "Made in the Shade" campaign to raise \$43,000 to replace the three shade structures. All will be made with dog-resistant materials. The shade structure in the largest dog yard will be bigger than the current structure and repositioned to avoid the sun.

In memory of their beloved Lab, Coach, who was adopted from the Douglas County shelter, a Douglas County couple is offering to match the first \$5,000 in donations (see related story, Page 2). To participate, simply write "Made in the Shade" on your check or choose the "'Made in the Shade" option on the DAWG website (dawgrescue.com).

On June 8, 2021 just two weeks after saying goodbye to our beloved 15-year-old dog and 19-year-old cat a handsome 9-year-old Lab became available for adoption at the Douglas County Animal Shelter. Without hesitation, we made an appointment to meet him. I'll never forget the moment we laid eyes on each other: Coach howled in excitement and rolled over to show us his belly as we approached. There was no question he was coming home with us.

Coach had been surrendered and was clearly broken-hearted, but so were we. This was our first rescue, and we had so much to learn about each other. He already had amazing recall, knew a few commands, and even had a special trick he played on his new parents: the "I haven't had breakfast or dinner yet" look. It worked often enough to earn him the occasional double meal. Such a trickster.

Early on, Coach revealed he wasn't a big fan of other dogs, which was perfectly fine with us. Surprisingly, he did like cats. Over a year ago, we adopted a kitten from DAWG, and Coach was the perfect big brother. We knew Coach loved his toys—but he also loved the cat's toys, often claiming them as his own. He'd greet company at the door with a cat toy in his mouth. All toys technically belonged to Coach, though he graciously allowed his brother to play with them from time to time.

It took some time to earn his complete trust, but once we did, Coach showered us with affection and loyalty. He looked forward to his monthly BarkBox delivery but nothing compared to his love for the ball. Except on vacation. On vacation, Coach took on a different persona, preferring the frisbee during his R&R time. True to his Labrador nature, swimming was his absolute favorite pastime.

Coach took no fewer than four vacations a year, always near water, and always with a frisbee. He was a sucker for older women, who gave the best belly rubs and sweet talk. Every year on his birthday or "gotcha" day, we celebrated Coach with a party, surrounded by all his favorite people complete with a piñata, cake, and his very own "Coachuterie" board.

On April 1 this year, we received the news no pet parent ever wants to hear: cancer. We were blessed to share 17 more beautiful days with our sweet boy loving him hard, celebrating him, and cherishing every moment. In the nearly four years we had with Coach, our hearts were never fuller. Not a single day passed without telling him how much we loved him.

Coach, thank you for the gift of your presence and for the countless cherished memories. While we've always had dogs, you were our first rescue. We specifically chose an older dog so we could spoil you rotten for the best of the rest. The short time we had together makes losing you even harder but we would do it all over again.

We share Coach's story because his life mattered, and he meant so much to so many. He was our first rescue, but certainly not our last. Our hope is that by sharing his story, we inspire others to consider adoption. It's such a rewarding journey, and there are so many deserving pets still waiting.

### Remembering former DAWG president Laura Winking

We were saddened to hear about the May death of Laura Winking, former DAWG president and one of the first DAWG volunteers.

In 2008, Laura was honored nationally by the Points of Light Institute in Washington D.C. as a "Daily Point of Light" for her years of volunteering for the animals at the Douglas County Animal Services Shelter.

We are grateful for the achievements made during Laura's tenure as a volunteer for our organization. Laura's efforts put DAWG on the map through visibility, community involvement and fundraising. Laura and Pat Stanley hosted "DAWG Tails", a local TV program all about DAWG. She pioneered wearing DAWG T-shirts at the weekly Farmers Market in Lampe Park to promote our group, and she would parade available shelter dogs with "Adopt Me" vests, collars, etc.

Her fund-raising skills established a pattern of annual events from garage sales to community events. The one we often remember was the Mutt Poker Walk. This was such a fun event and Laura was instrumental in making it a true community undertaking by involving local business owners.

In the early history of our group, we also remember the Carson Valley Days parade held in June. With Laura and other volunteers, we walked with coffee cans along the route asking for donations for DAWG.

Laura's passion and compassion for rescue animals was unmatched. One of her many hats volunteering was organizing the shelter dog walkers. As the Lead or Captain, she accumulated the daily information on the dogs from volunteers and disseminated this to all volunteers. Everyone knew what each dog's behavior was that day, who needed medical attention, and other needs to promote their adoptability. Laura adopted Elvis, a tripod from the shelter who was fortunate to live out his life with her and her husband, Larry.

Laura was a caring, smart person, beautiful inside and out. She was a class act and a true friend to many. Lewis Carroll wrote that the secret is to surround yourself with people who make your heart smile. Laura was one of those people. Her spirit will live on in the hearts of all who remember her.

## Make a difference in the lives of homeless animals

The state of the s

- become a shelter volunteer for Douglas County Animal Services.

Dog walking volunteers work one-on-one with the adoptable dogs, taking them outside for exercise and attention. The shelter can be noisy and stressful for the dogs; having quality time outside with volunteers who care for them helps overcome that stress.

Cat care volunteers help the cats relax in the shelter environment, holding, petting and brushing them.

Ongoing socialization helps the cat relax and be more friendly when meeting a potential adopter.

New volunteers are partnered with experienced dog walkers or cat carers to learn the ropes of caring for these vulnerable animals. Volunteers are asked to dedicate at least 1 2-hour shift a week.

Prospective volunteers must be at least 18 years old, submit an application and complete a background check through Douglas County Human Resources.



### **DAWG Salutes our Veterans and Active Military**



Veterans and active-duty military who live in Douglas County have a friend in DAWG.

If they adopt a dog or cat from Douglas County Animal Services, DAWG will cover any vaccination and spay/neuter fees included in the adoption costs. (The adopter will still be responsible for a \$10 adoption fee and an \$8 animal license fee).

In addition, veterans and active-duty personnel can qualify for the following programs without meeting the programs' low-income requirements:

- Community Assistance, which helps with the costs of veterinary care.
- Fix-a-Family Pet, which provides spays and neuters for family pets for a nominal co-pay. (A related program, Fix-a-Pit Bull, provides spay and neuters for pit bulls and pit mixes for a nominal co-pay without any income requirements.)

Verification of veterans or active-duty military status is required. To learn more, call 775-267-7325.
