New cat facility plans under way - stay tuned for how to help!

In our Summer newsletter, we reported that the Douglas County Board of Commissioners approved \$40,000 as seed money for a new cat facility to replace the inadequate and decrepit cat cottage at the Douglas County Animal Shelter.

Since then, we have made tremendous progress! DAWG member Bill Iverson, an architect by profession, volunteered to design the structure. As of mid-August,

when this newsletter was being edited, we have an approved floor plan, a 90 percent-approved site plan, and a sneak preview of the proposed Cat Facility Elevation drawing.

In light of this progress, and the County's commitment to manage building permits and

to use Douglas County monies to purchase materials, the DAWG General Membership approved fund raising and contributing up to \$100,000 to help bring this new facility to fruition.

Huckleberry - home at last!

Huckleberry needed to get out of the shelter.

The boxer mix had developed 'happy tail syndrome' in which his constantly wagging tail hit against the kennel wall with such force that it cracked and bled. DAWG bought a Tail Saver to protect Huckleberry's tail, but it wasn't the best solution.

Determined to find the right home, Shelter staff and DAWG volunteers promoted Huckleberry through social media, ads and this newsletter. In time, the strategy worked!

"We had talked about getting a dog for a while, but we were waiting for the right time," says Lexi. "We saw Huckleberry on Facebook a few times, and then someone showed us the ad. We said that's it, we have to go get him."

It was a perfect match, she says. Camping is his favorite activity as he gets to wander around with his people and explore.

"We couldn't believe he wasn't already adopted, he's such a great dog. We joke all the time that he was waiting for us."

Huck's tail is healing, and he's gained some much-needed weight. At a healthy 85 pounds, he still thinks he's a lap dog. And he's still giving those Boxer hugs that made him a favorite with Shelter staff and DAWG volunteers.

"He stands on the bed so he's eye to eye with me, and he puts his paws on my shoulders in a big hug. He is the best boy in the world, and we love him to death," Lexi adds. "



Love and patience pays off with forever home for Milo

We adopted a black German Shepherd back in January 2015. He was named "Rocky," and we changed it to Milo. He was about a year old then.

On the day we adopted him, we were told that from October to December of 2014, he had been adopted and returned to the shelter three times by three different people. He had been returned because he had bad separation anxiety and would get out of crates or jump fences.

As I was paying for the adoption fee at the front desk, the lady said to me "Poor guy, I hope he doesn't come back because every time he comes back, he's more traumatized."

I said to her "He's not coming back here."

The second day we had him, he tried to jump our backyard fence while my partner and I were on the outside of the fence talking. After that, we said "Oh, boy, what have we gotten ourselves in to?"

We worked with him for about 7 or 8 months. It was hard work, but it was all worth it! He turned out to be a very good boy. He's sweet, obedient, a lover boy, and a cuddler. He protects our house, his little chihuahua brother, his two Lab sisters and his two moms. His nickname is "Big Baby Huey." He is a happy and goofy boy and we all just adore him.

Benny gets adopted - with an assist from DAWG

Tina had no intention of adopting a dog the month she met Benny (now Ripple). A chance remark from her real estate agent about a shelter in Reno got her looking. She checked out dogs in Reno and in Carson City but didn't see the right fit.

"Then I thought, 'why don't I look at my own shelter here in Douglas County," she says. That's when she saw Benny.

Tina immediately filled out an adoption application online and went to the shelter to meet him. "I sat down on the floor, and he came right up, sat in my lap and starting kissing my face. I said 'you are coming home with me."

Tina wasn't discouraged when the Shelter staff told her that the cheerful chihuahua mix had a heart murmur, but she realized his medical needs could take a toll on her finances.

That's when Shelter staff told her that DAWG would cover the costs of Benny's annual echocardiogram through its Post Adoption Agreement program. "That sealed the deal," says Tina.

Post Adoption Agreements provide financial assistance for certain animals that are hard to adopt because of medical needs that may be cost prohibitive for some potential adopters. They are another way that DAWG seeks to better the lives of Douglas County Animals.

Today, Benny has a new name – Ripple – and his adoptive mom couldn't be happier. "He needed me, and I needed him," says Tina. "He is just a joy." ♥

Playful, lovable and super-smart – that's how volunteer dog walker Jill describes King, a 1 ½-year-old Akita mix who has become a shelter team favorite.

"It took him no time to learn how to jump over the agility course at the shelter, and he walks on a leash very well! In my eight months as a volunteer dog walker, I would have to say Kingsbury is in my top three most favorite dogs!"

King, or Kingsbury, was discovered running in the Kingsbury Road neighborhood, which is how he got his name. Since coming to the shelter, he has successfully completed multiple six-week training courses and learned how to behave like the 'royal' dog he is.

Stray cats and kittens have a friend in DAWG

Since May 2016, the Douglas Animal Welfare Group's Found Cat Program has helped close to 2,000 homeless felines.

While some are stray or abandoned adult cats and kittens, the vast majority are kittens born to feral mamas. The Found Cat Program foster families devote a lot of time and effort to these little ones to make sure they are socialized and healthy before making them available for adoption.

"Fosters are the heart of the program and the reason we've been so successful," says Found Cat Program founder Tondra Vees. "They provide temporary housing, attention and love."

"The fostering experience is very rewarding," she adds. "Nurturing a helpless, suffering kitten into a beautiful, healthy, loving pet ready for a forever home is so worthwhile."

New fosters will have plenty of support as they learn how to care for these vulnerable animals. DAWG covers all expenses such as food, litter, and supplies, and will coordinate and pay for any needed medical care. Foster homes must have a safe, adequate space that meets the needs of their foster kitties.

Once the cat or kitten is ready for adoption, DAWG gets the word out via Petfinder (linked to dawgrescue.com), social media, and special adoption events.

Although DAWG is teaming up with Douglas County to build a new, expanded cat facility at the Shelter, the need for fosters will continue. That's because the number of cats needing temporary homes will likely exceed the Shelter space available. (In July alone, Found Cat fosters cared for a total of 54 kittens!)

If you find a stray cat or kitten: Call the Douglas County Animal Shelter at 775-782-9061 and file a found cat report; if it is an older cat (not kitten), take it to the Animal Shelter or a veterinarian to check for a microchip. Animal Shelter staff will explain the resources available; if the best option is to seek a foster for the cat, they will refer you to DAWG's Found Cat Program, and DAWG will try to place the feline in foster care. If you can care for the found cat temporarily, DAWG can help with supplies, if needed.



HOW TO HELP

To learn more about being a foster for homeless cats and kittens, call DAWG at 775-267-7325 and ask to be referred to Tondra Vees, the program's manager.

Fancy Feast Kitten Pate, Purina One Dry Kitten, and PurinaProPlan Kitten Pate and cat litter are always needed and may be delivered to the Douglas County Animal Shelter, 921 Dump Rd, Gardnerville, NV 89410. Be sure the indicate that the donation is for DAWG.
