DAWG's mission is to better the lives of Douglas County animals. Here is a summary of how we worked toward that goal in 2024.

Thank you to all the donors and volunteers who helped make this happen!

YEAR IN REVIEW

- Shelter volunteers spent 4,068 hours caring for the animals at Douglas County Animal Services (DCAS).
- DAWG members spent over 4,700 hours administering and managing our programs and almost 7,000 hours caring for non-shelter animals (fostering, trapping, transporting, etc.).
- DAWG members provided care and assistance to 213 dogs and 345 cats that were adopted from DCAS. This included activities such as dog walking (365 days a year in all kinds of weather!), cat care and socialization, and fostering.

Community Outreach


- Co-hosted the 7th Annual Carson Valley Turkey Trot with the Carson Valley Food Bank.
- Produced "DAWG's Got Talent" fundraiser, raising \$25,000 to help Douglas County animals.
- Launched a fundraising campaign to help pay for the new DCAS Cat Cottage and raised \$34,098 in 2024 (our goal is to raise \$100,000).

Investing in Animals and the People who love them

DAWG spent:

- \$66,400 assisting low-income Douglas County residents who needed help paying for their animals' veterinary care through our "Community Assistance" program.
- \$35,300 to foster and provide necessary medical care for 264 stray domestic cats/kittens pending admission or adoption through DCAS. This service was provided through our "Found Cat" program.
- \$35,100 providing medical care for animals that were at DCAS, including: wellness exams, dental work, senior exams, x-rays, surgeries, and post-adoption medical assistance through our "Shelter Medical" program.
- \$24,400 for our "Trap, Neuter and Return" program (TNR), which provided spay/neuter, vaccinations and minor medical for 284 feral/community cats in Douglas County.
- \$17,100 to incentivize Douglas County residents to adopt hard-to-adopt animals.
- \$16,790 helping 180 low-income Douglas County residents spay and neuter their pets through the "Fix-a Family Pet" program.
- \$8,200 to cover cat adoption fees and rabies vaccines.
- \$5,470 for the purchase of microchips for DCAS dogs and cats.
- \bullet \$4,960 to provide cat and dog food to Douglas County families in need (distributed by F.I.S.H. in the Ranchos).
- \$2,838 for post-adoption behavior training of 11 former DCAS shelter dogs.
- \$2,764 helping spay and neuter 17 Douglas County Pit Bulls and Pit Bull mixes through our low cost "Fix-a Bull" program.
- \$1,130 to assist Douglas County Veterans adopting animals from DCAS.
- \$920 to buy half the vaccines used to vaccinate the dogs and cats residing at DCAS.

Cat Cottage campaign off to bright start

The future is looking bright for Douglas County felines as support for the new Cat Cottage at the Animal Services shelter continues to grow.

In December, the Douglas County Board of County Commissioners announced that CORE Construction is donating the labor to build the cottage, which at about 1,000 square feet will be three times bigger than the current temporary

structure. In addition, TSK Architects donated their services to finalize project drawings. The initial design work was done pro bono by architect, and DAWG volunteer, Bill Iverson. Construction is expected to start later this year.

In the meantime, DAWG launched the "Feed the Kitty" campaign to raise \$100,000 to help pay for building materials. As of March 15, we are two-thirds of the way there! Thank you to everyone who has donated so far.

Dog & Cat Adoption Updates

ARROW and CUDDLES are growing like little weeds. They have great personalities, so loving, playful, all the good things. They take naps and when they wake up, they both go out and go potty. BAILY (now Hondo) is doing great. He's learning what he can and can't do and we're bonding perfectly. Life is grand. COCO is such a cuddle-bug. My

parents have dogs, and they all get along together. Such a good boy. FREYA is sweet and affectionate and one of the best dogs I've had. I left her alone for 3 ½ hours on Monday and she didn't chew or go to the bathroom. We take 2 walks per day usually around the small parks because my yard isn't very big, and I want to socialize her with other people and dogs. She's met my neighbor and their dog and they got along well. HUNTER has his childhood moments eating things he shouldn't and chewing up all my German Shepherd's toys and getting the beepers out and me trying to stop him. At the end of the day, it is all good and he crawls up in my lap to ask forgiveness. JADON (now Benni) is almost potty trained so it's all good. Even though he is supposed to be Shepherd he looks like he has Pit Bull in him.

JAKE At first, he was very confused from everything he had been through, and he does have separation anxiety. That is not a problem because I bring him to work with me. Jake is such a good-hearted dog. All he wants to do is please. It's 'just let me know what you want, and I will do it.' He is so sweet. JAX is gentle, playful and gets along with everyone. We have a Corgi who had a hard time accepting it when we had to put our other dog down, and she was ornery to Jax at first. Now they play outside. Even my Mom plays with him. JUPITER is doing amazingly well. It took just a few days, and she was crate trained. I work from home so I can keep an eye on her but when I went out for 3 1/2 hours she did fine. She nips Cody, my toy Manchester Terrier/Chihuahua, and he lets her know when he has had enough. We think she looks like a Belgian Malinois so we are doing DNA on her and will let you know. ONYX (now Buddy) was uncomfortable for a few days, but then he warmed up. He's very, very affectionate, sometimes a little too much. He sleeps with the kids (ages 7 and 9). We take him on walks and runs and he's good on the leash. He's good at sit and stay and now we are working on extending the time. OSO has been here long enough that he is starting to show his personality. We're seeing how playful he is and how very, very sweet. He didn't know what a couch was, and he didn't know about cuddles. Now he knows he has a whole couch to himself, and he loves to snuggle. RILEY (now Zoe) is adjusting to our family and eating well. She goes for walks every morning and evening and she does act aggressively when she sees other dogs or cats, so we are training her ourselves while we wait for Guy's class. She isn't treat oriented so it is more of a challenge. But Guy has been very supportive to us in this waiting period. ROMEO (now Oreo) is doing great getting settled in. Daisy, our Australian Shepherd, and he get along great.

SAGE (now Sierra) is actually doing well with the house training. We have pads around the house, but she is good about going outside. When we take her for walks, she wants to play with the other dogs she sees but we are cautious about that since she doesn't have all her shots. We're training her and she has 'sit' down pretty good. She's a good dog. SPOT is doing great. He has 2 favorite spots; one is by the slider along with all his squeaky toys and the other is on the bed. He doesn't bark much except when he sees someone walk by. He does pull when he is on the leash so I'm thinking about hiring a dog walker to get him more exercise. From the moment I saw him I knew he was going home with me. SUNDAY is doing really well with us and getting along with our other dog. We go to two dog parks and he really enjoys both parks. We're keeping the name Sunday because I am a Special Ed teacher and all my students know his name and ask about him. TINO (now Valentino) The first night was challenging. He didn't know what was going on. But then he did a big turnaround. He seems to be quite flexible. Totally fine with the grandkids. He's not hyper - in fact we think we might have a couch potato on our hands. His name is VALENTINO because he is a lover. VENUS (now Whiskey) OMG she's awesome. A really good dog. Took her on her first vacation to L.A. and she did well after we took her out of the crate and gave her a towel to lay on, on the floor. She's a good fit. ZEUS (now Zuzu) We're doing crate training for short periods of time. He was left alone for 4 hours the other day, and he was fine. He does have a doggie door so he can come and go as he pleases. We are taking him to doggie day care tomorrow and the next day because my husband and I will both be gone. I never had a rescue dog before and my daughter who worked at AMS for 16 years is giving me advice. He's a good boy.





ASPEN is doing fine, is more friendly and is eating more. BEANS is a real joy, a really nice cat. BERNADETTE is playful and loves the kids. She is such a great cat. BUBBLES is great and crazy as a nut. GREGORY (not shown) turned out to be a girl, so she is now Gracie. The owners love them. BUCKEE is doing wonderfully and is very happy and loved. BUTTERCUP plays with the other cat and is really nice. CHEDDAR (now Caesar) has made friends with the owner's Burmese Mountain dog and sleeps on the dog's tail. When he accidentally escapes, he comes right back in.



DOUG (now Frankie) is doing wonderfully. He's a very good kitty and gets along with the owners' other cat. FASTBALL and SLIDER live together now. They are great cats and have been to the vet for their shots. FRANCINE (now Franny) has been spayed and everything is good. FRANKIE is awesome. He is the cat whose tail had to be amputated, but he was a butthead at the vet and refused to take the cone. The tail looks good now and was dry the day after the surgery. HAILEY hit the jackpot house. HANNAH (now Princess) is amazing and perfect with the owner's two yellow labs. The owner has never had a cat she loved so much.



HARLEY (now Grayson) is a sweet, rambunctious, cuddly kitten. KC settled right in. Everything is going really well with her.

L'IL BIT (now Mickey) is absolutely amazing. He has become a hangar cat as his owner has helicopters in a hangar. Fifteen people are always around to adore him. He's super fun and sleeps in the helicopter. LUNA is doing well although she hasn't been introduced yet to the other cats in the house. She loves the dogs, and the Aussie protects her and thinks the cat is his baby. MATER (now Michelangelo) and McQUEEN (now Leonardo Da Vinci) have had their shots and are doing well. They have very different personalities. MISSY CATNIP (now Gizmo) just had her vet checkup and will be spayed in December.

From ignored to adored – the story of Jack and Missy

Jack and Missy have quite the tale to tell.

They spent their early months in separate outside kennels with very little human contact or opportunities to play. As time went on, they missed out on normal puppy experiences and became more fearful of humans.

A pair of determined DAWG volunteers convinced the dogs' guardians to let them take the pair to a home with a professional trainer. DAWG agreed to cover their boarding and training costs during their initial training period.

Kitten's grateful adopter amazed by dedication of foster mom

Hello, my name is Marie Field-Carpenter, and I have a story to share with you.

Back in July, I lost my beloved calico ragdoll, Pooka. She lived to be 15, and I was devastated when she died I decided the best way to start to heal and live my life without her was to adopt a cat.

I found a kitten on Petfinder that was being cared for at a rescue in Washoe Valley and drove out to meet her. The kitten I was looking for was sitting on a cat tree forlornly gazing out a window with a view of dried weeds. I sat on a bench, and she plopped on my lap, lay on her back, kissed my hand, and purred while the foster owner left the room. I felt like she had chosen me, and I melted. I named her Kelpie.

Kelpie chirps and talks and makes all kinds of vocal noises I've never heard before from a cat. But it seemed to me she was lonely and would like a playmate. Two is better, right?

I resumed my search for a second kitten and came across Rosie, a kitten being fostered through DAWG's Found Cat Program. I began communicating with Rosie's foster mom Gwen and answered some questions about myself and my experience with cats and why I was interested in adopting Rosie. We decided she'd be a good fit and I renamed her Selkie.

Gwen told me she was treating Selkie for ringworm. I explained I couldn't take Selkie after all, because I have a 1-bedroom apartment and Selkie would need her own room that required sterilization daily while she was recovering. Gwen very generously offered to take care of Selkie while she healed. I was dumbfounded and moved by Gwen's offer to care for Selkie for an additional month.

I received regular communication from Gwen with calls, email, texts and photos. This was comforting. I felt Selkie was in the best of care with Gwen.

When the time arrived for me to finally get Selkie, the Davis Creek Fire was raging. I had planned on driving to Minden to pick her up but couldn't expose myself to the smoke with my asthma. Gwen offered to drive her to Reno, but I was concerned about smoke exposure to Gwen and Selkie. We agreed on the following weekend. Gwen had an appointment in Reno and brought Selkie with her. She gave me a bag loaded with toys, canned food and kibble and helped me get Selkie safely in the car. Finally, Selkie was home!

I am so impressed with the DAWG Found Cat community. Gwen's extraordinary contribution to saving kittens and cats is stunning. She taxied Selkie back and forth to the vet and ensured Selkie had the right medication to treat ringworm. Then she had the challenging experience of administering the meds to a kitten who wasn't on board with that idea. We need more Gwens in this world.

As for Kelpie and Selkie, they are adjusting. It is an interesting process with two spirited, playful, inquisitive kittens who have a colorful past. After all that's happened in Selkie's journey, I can't help but feel that she is meant to be with me and Kelpie, and that all will work out with time and patience ... and a sense of humor!

Rocky is a smart boy who is mastering basic commands during training classes. His perfect


match is an active person or family who will continue to train with him so he can reach his full potential. He gets along with most dogs.
