Remember the dog Tom met before he decided on Boots? Tom did. It was a handsome 2-year-old Border Collie named Bently. Their first meeting in May had not gone well. Bently – who had a reputation for not liking men – had been snippy.

This time was different though. "This time, I had Boots with me, and because of that, it worked out," says Tom.

With Boots in tow, Tom returned to Douglas County Animal Shelter and asked about Bently. Shelter staff brought Bently out for a meet-and-greet with his prospective new family. Bently and Tom went for a walk, accompanied by Boots and a shelter staff member. By the end of the walk, Tom knew he'd found Boots a friend.

At home, Boots and Bently get on famously.

"They play in the back yard all day. They share. When I adopted Bently, I got him a water bowl and food dish, but I noticed quickly that they drink and eat out of the same dishes," says Tom.

Boots is the leader, says Tom. "She has been the alpha dog since Day 1. When Bently goes too far, she lets him know it."

As for Bently, he is learning every day what it means to be part of a family. "He is getting calmer," says Tom. "He realizes he isn't going anywhere. This is his home."

Tom has no regrets about going from a no-dog home to a two-dog home. "They often lie face-to-face when they are sleeping. They love each other, and they love me. They bring so much to my life − I am really glad I did this." ■

One day someone came and did a wellness check and determined that the owner needed to go to a home to be cared for.

Priscilla was taken to the shelter. There they determined she needed to be shaved, so she was taken to a vet, anesthetized – because no one could handle her – and shorn of more than $2\frac{1}{2}$ pounds of matted fur.

Priscilla was confused, scared and missing her human. She sat in the shelter cage and hissed, bit and scratched anyone that came near her. The shelter finally determined that she was unadoptable and put a message out to DAWG members asking for anyone that might adopt this very frightened, untouchable cat.

A DAWG volunteer read the message and thought about it for a while. Finally, she decided "I'll take her." She drove to the shelter, unsure of how they would even get the cat into a kennel for the ride home. When she arrived, she discovered Priscilla was already in a carrier. Whew! So, home they went.

There Priscilla was released into the "cat room" where there was litter, kibble, water and beds – a safe place where she could decompress and come out at her own pace. She started sitting on the futon and the new owner started sitting near her.

As the months passed, Priscilla allowed the new owner to sit nearer and nearer and finally even touch her. A year-and-a-half later, Priscilla lets her owner pick her up and

carry her, pet her, and even care for her when she is sick. She has gone from an "unadoptable cat" to a well-loved family pet, thanks to the determination of a DAWG volunteer.

ADOPTION FOLLOW-UPS



BLUE seems to have some separation anxiety, but he is starting to learn not to pull. I have gotten him a no-pull harness. I took him on a 4-mile walk and he seemed to like that. CHICA (now Annie) I've only had her a short while and it takes time to get to know an animal. So far OK. Her rare breed (Dogo Argentina) is not the kind of animal I am used to. She does resemble a Pit but doesn't act like one. She is very intelligent. DAVID was hiding under the bed when we first brought him home and we left him to decompress. Now he has moved over to his own bed. GEMINI is a great dog. I'm socializing her quite a bit and she is doing fantastically. JAKE is so mellow and loving. I have eight workers and he gets along with them. He has a run with a big doghouse and 3 acres to roam when he is not in his run. He will come inside in the winter. KARMA (now Tyra) is feeling right at home and having a good time. She seems to like being with people. She is high energy, but we're used to that because we have had a few Borders. Our boys, ages 14 and 15, run with her. MAX is sitting right next to me trying to eat my popcorn. Someone has spent a lot of time with him. He comes, sits, lies down, jumps on the bed. He minds so well! It is impressive.



NANI is doing great. I've sent pictures and video to the Shelter staff. WALLY poops and pees everywhere. He is a poop monster! He is a lot of work, but we knew that would be the case since he is a puppy. I also have a Coonhound named Scooby Doo and they are getting to be friends. These are my boys. We are very happy with him. He's got a good home here. WAYLIN has settled in pretty well. He's a great addition to our family and a great companion for his sister. AURORA (now Domi) is becoming less shy. She's getting out of the closet where she hides and has made friends with the squirrels outside. BASSET (now Raven) is doing well. Her owners say she is amazing. She sleeps all day and plays all night - she's a wild child in the morning. She gets along with the dog. COACH (now Thor) and Drako (now Loki) have adjusted well. They play all the time and like the dog. DAZZLE is very social. The owner is harness training her even though Dazzle hates it. She wants to be able to take her in her car without the cat carrier. The owner's sons adore her.



GIZMO is a sweetheart and gets along with the other cat. HERMOINE is doing great. Her owners love her. KAI was shy at first, but is getting more friendly. She is strictly an indoor cat. Her adopter is glad he adopted from the shelter, and describes Kai as hyper potty trained. KALEA (now Lux) is a sweetie. Her adopters love the shelter for doing such a good job. KC is doing wonderfully and growing like a weed. He fits in well with the other animals in the family and has grown a lot. A perfect cat. POPTART (now Pork Chop) is amazing.

We are happy to report that between July and September, we succeeded in finding happy homes for

28 dogs, 2 puppies, 18 cats, 51 kittens and 17 rabbits!

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PROGRAM SPOTLIGHT

Helping adopted shelter dogs stay in their homes with Behavior Assistance Training

When DAWG needs to enroll a rescue dog in its Behavior Assistance Training Program, the first person they call is Greg Gibbs.

DAWG created the Behavior Assistance Training (BAT) Program to help adopters of rescue dogs with serious behavior problems, with the hope that the dog can remain in a loving home rather than being returned to the shelter or worse.

Greg, of Gregarious Dog Training, is DAWG's primary contract dog trainer in the BAT program. There's no dog that Greg doesn't give his heart and soul to while trying to help because he knows that most serious dog behavior issues come from a place of fear and feeling unsafe.

Greg's first goal is to gain the dog's trust and create a safe environment before he



knows that gaining a dog's trust is the first step in helping with behavioral problems.

begins to work with the dog – amazing things can happen after this! Life in the shelter, even for a brief time, is highly stressful for most dogs. Greg works with these struggling shelter dogs, and has helped many overcome their fears, enabling them to be adopted into loving homes.

Greg has been training and working with dogs for over 25 years and is strictly a force-free positive reinforcement trainer. The American Veterinary Society of Animal Behavior recently published a position statement supporting positive reinforcement training as the only training method to effectively and humanely change an animal's emotional response, and therefore its long-term behavior, while creating a loving bond with its human.

From strong dog aggression to inter-dog household conflict, hyper-arousal, barrier aggression and separation anxiety, Greg knows how to help owners and their dogs so the dogs can stay in their homes. He also knows how difficult it is to own a struggling dog as it can be a frustrating, isolating, and discouraging experience, so his goal is to help the human as much as the dog. Dogs just want humans to understand where they are coming from and why they behave the way they do. We are lucky that we have Greg to help us help these dogs.

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

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
